The world is anxiously waiting to see what God can do in, by, for and through one nation wholly given to Him.





TOM KEEP was a Communist for 22 years. Formerly president of the National Amalgamated Stevedores and Dokers Union, he has been one of the principle strike leaders in the London docks since the war. In 1949 such a strike was effective in tving up 91 ships for five weeks, at a loss to Britain of £217,000,000.

In the spring of 1951, an attempt to tie up all the docks in Britain failed because he and many others, former protagonists of class war, were applying the superior idea of Moral Re-Armament. This positive force is spreading the answer successfully to all the ports of the world.
