

Doing their bit to change SA

A GROUP of 25 young people from all parts of the world have voluntarily given up their jobs to come to South Africa to help bring about some change in the country.

The group, which arrived on Saturday, has come in response to a desperate plea from 70 South Africans of all races who wrote to the group saying:

'We ask your help at this critical time in our country.

'We believe that a force of men and women . . . could play a major part in bringing about something new in Southern Africa.'

The invitation from the South Africans went out after some of them had met the group of workers at a Moral Re-

Armament conference in Switzerland last July.

Moral Re-Armament is an international organisation which tries to help world problems by changing individuals.

'It is based on the belief that human nature is at the root of the problems in the world,' said Ms Mary Lean, the information officer for the group of workers.

The group will be in Cape Town for a month. On Monday they visited the campus at the University of the Western Cape and on Tuesday they will meet several members of Parliament.

Ms Lean said she could not comment on what line the talks with the MPs would take.
