What lies behind the response of Africa's leadership, black and white, to Moral Re-Armament? In the issues which lie at the heart of Africa's unrest—in Kenya, Central Africa, West Africa and the Sudan—MRA has demonstrated the effectiveness of a new approach. It has drawn a moral battleline on which men of character have been able to unite.

The Editor of an African newspaper recently described how men in MRA have tackled the issues of corruption and racialism in West Africa. Two years ago the District Officer in one area had angered the African leaders by his cold, superior attitude. He was, however, greatly struck by the different attitude of his African clerk who introduced him to a neighbouring district officer in MRA. He decided to make the creation of better relations a priority and apologised to a nationalist leader whose authority he had tried to undermine. Since that time a great change has come over the whole district.

When a rumour was heard that he was to be transferred to another district the people petitioned that he remain and refused to accept a substitute. If the government wished to promote him, they said, they would bear the extra cost of his senior rank on condition that he was allowed to stay.

In another neighbouring district a result of the emphasis of absolute moral standards has been a wave of honesty in public life. African officials have declared war on bribery. There had been much wrangling, for instance, over the allocation of trading facilities which were greatly in demand. Now public officials decide the question justly, with no bribery.

The Sudan dispute and British relations with Egypt provide an illuminating example of our frequent failure to understand the ideological issues involved. There has been progress recently over the Sudan. Both Sayed Saleh Mohammed Shangiti, the Speaker of the Sudan Parliament, and Sir Sayed Rahman El Mahdi, the leader of the Sudan Independence Party have come to an agreement with the Egyptian premier. All the principal parties have been in touch with Moral Re-Armament and invited Dr. Buchman to bring task forces to their countries.

In a recent speech, General Neguib took a remarkably conciliatory line towards Britain on the question, which many people feel has not received the consideration it has deserved. At the end he stressed certain general conditions for the settlement of the dispute which were obviously meant for Egyptian public opinion. These few sentences were highlighted in reports and received a negative response from official quarters. A wiser understanding of the issues and personalities at stake, however, would have helped us to see that change on our part as well would bring a new factor into this situation.

INDIA WELCOMES DR. BUCHMAN

It was sunset as the S.S. Strathnaver drew into Bombay harbour with Dr. Buchman and an MRA task force. At the quayside beneath a great welcoming notice stood the Mayor of Bombay, who had been waiting two hours to welcome Dr. Buchman with the traditional Indian garland of flowers. The Sheriff of Bombay, representatives of the Government, executives of Tata Industries, and Scindia Shipping Lines, and other distinguished citizens were at the quay to greet them. A political historian from Asia commented: "This voyage is as significant for the world as the voyage of the Mayflower was for America."

Next day, after a press conference, came the first official ceremony—a reception by the Mayor of Bombay in the magnificent Pherozeshah Mehta hanging gardens on Malabar Hill. The principal ministers in the Cabinet, and 600 leading citizens of Bombay, heard the Mayor describe MRA as "the spearhead of human aspirations for a new world."

Later, the guests moved down to the Excelsior Theatre for the crowded première of Jotham Valley, which opened a two-week run of the MRA plays.

Mr. Moraji Desai, Chief Minister of Bombay State, which has a population of 36 million, addressed the audience after the play on the opening night. "We are grateful," he said, "not only for the entertainment and pleasure but for the lessons to apply to ourselves.

MRA preaches Gandhi's way of life and I will live it. It gives us hope and strength to fulfil his life. I must reform myself; then we can give the world the result of our efforts."

Special six-page supplements on Moral Re-Armament were carried by both the Bombay Chronicle and the Free Press Journal, which has the second largest national circulation in India. A leading article in the Bombay Chronicle says: "The visit is a breath of fresh air, the story of the carnest endeavours of a devoted and inspired minority to remake the world. From the board-room of Tatas to the Dhobis' laundry workers' union, from the drawing-room of Government House to Kamgar Maidan, the heart of industrial Bombay and scene of historic riots and revolution, from the ballroom of the Taj Mahal Hotel to the factory sheds—that's exactly the distance covered by the Moral Re-Armament team since their arrival a fortnight ago. The journey is not long in miles but covers an immense amount of ground."

The Chronicle and Free Press Journal reported the highlights of the MRA visit: meetings in board-rooms, schools, universities, docks, business houses and homes, and conversations with the political parties and the staffs of the public utilities. There was a mass meeting of 7,000 industrial textile workers at Kamgar Maidan, where for the first time since Independence, the trade unions opposing the Congress and the Socialist Parties ing was chaired by Mr. Purmber of the National Executive Party.

On 30 November Dr. Buchman returned to the scene of his early walks with Mahatma Gandhi at the Ahmedabad Ashram where Gandhi launched his movement of national liberation and regeneration. Dr. Buchman told a thousand leaders of the textile Union which Gandhi founded: "It is really a holy pilgrimage for me to come here again in the spirit of Gandhi and to think how one man alone with God became the leader of millions. We are his grateful debtors. Mill-owners and mill-workers of India, guided by God, will make India the prophet nation in the world. This message will go from the mills to the millions. I believe that India will be the nation of the future."

After a short visit to Agra, the Moral Re-Armament force arrived in New Delhi on 3 December.

NEWS IN BRIEF

William Green—William Green, President of the American Federation of Labour, like his fellow-miner, Philip Murray of the CIO who died twelve days before him, was a Christian with a faith. He will be deeply missed in Washington, where a generation of legislators and diplomats knew and honoured him.

For many years, both William Green and Philip Murray were warm supporters of Moral Re-Armament. During the war, MRA patriotic plays were part of the official programme of the AF of L International Convention in Toronto, and of Philip Murray's United Steelworkers of America.

Later, William Green and Philip Murray served on the National Committee which launched *The Forgotten* Factor in the National Theatre, Washington.

In June, 1951, when the Chairman and members of the Foreign Affairs and Foreign Relations Committees of the United States Congress invited national leaders to the World Assembly for Moral Re-Armament at Mackinac Island, Michigan, William Green wrote to labour leaders across the world: "The American labour movement warmly supports this welcome and expresses the hope that you and others of our trade union brothers from Europe, Asia, Africa, Australasia and the Americas will attend this gathering and so contribute to the new world of liberty and justice we all desire."

Arab League Secretary—Dr. Abdel K. Hassouna, who is representing Egypt at the United Nations, addressed the weekend conference of seven American Airlines at a Moral Re-Armament Training Centre in New York this month.

Dr. Hassouna is Secretary-General of the Arab League, representing 42 million Arabs, and is a former Foreign Minister of Egypt. He was in Cairo at the time of Dr. Buchman's visit to General Neguib. "Nothing can give me greater satisfaction than to welcome as many from Moral Re-Armament as possible in my country," Dr. Hassouna said.

French Press—The daily French newspaper Le Progrès of Lyon has published during the week 29 October to 4 November a series of six feature articles on MRA by Joseph Barraud, the Editor, who attended the Caux Assembly this year.

The series opened with an illustrated article, headlined on the front page "Moral Re-Armament is out to bring a revolution without hate." The following series dealt with the way MRA brings a solution to colonial and industrial problems, the question of relations between France and Germany, the running of Caux and a final article on the fundamental basis of MRA, entitled: "It must begin with peace in your own heart."

Denmark—525 citizens of Aarhus, Denmark's second largest town, have sent a petition to the editor of the provincial paper, *Aarhus Stiffstidende*, asking for regular news of the Asian conference through their daily newspaper. The editor has published a notice saying that a special service of news has been arranged.

During the first ten months of this year over 800 articles on MRA have appeared in Danish newspapers. Moscow Radio—Moscow Radio broadcast on Moral Re-Armament in the USSR Home Service on 21 November. "Moral Re-Armament," it stated, "has been working at the front of the ideological struggle for several decades. In addition to building bridgeheads on every continent and training cadres who would be capable of spreading its ideology among the masses, Moral Re-Armament has now started on its decisive task, its total expansion throughout the world." The broadcast deplored the response of the free world to "an ideology which would attract the masses by a positive plan, the absence of which is regarded by many as the reason for the failure of their propaganda."
