SEVEN HUNDRED FOR DINNER

The largest dinner ever in the Australian Federal Parliament took place this month as a result of Michael and Erica Henderson's visit to Canberra in June.

Michael and Erica came to Australia in May, and in the next six weeks travelled 8,500 kms, speaking about the challenge of reconciliation. 450 copies of Michael's books were sold.

Their visit coincided with Sorry Day when half a million Australians apologised to Aboriginal people for hurts inflicted by past policies. MRA played a formative role in this campaign. Michael, as an authority on the role of apology in healing wrongs, caught the media's interest. He was interviewed 13 times on radio (twice nationwide), and featured on TV and in newspapers.

Canberra, the national capital, among those who heard him was Alice Chu, a physiotherapist of Chinese background. Like other Asian Australians, she has been alarmed by the recent growth in racial tension in Australia, and was seeking a way to counter this trend. She listened as Michael told of people overcoming racism through a creative response.

The next night, she came with two Asian friends to discuss how a creative response could be made here. The idea which emerged was to hold a dinner in the Great Hall of Parliament. Within ten days they had brought together a committee of 20. They called the dinner 'United in Diversity', expressing its theme thus:

We have committed ourselves to this land. Its joys are ours and we contribute to its rich culture. Its griefs are ours and we can help heal its hurts. This dinner gives us the opportunity to express our contribution to the life of Australia, for the sake of all our children.

Two months later, 700 people packed the Great Hall of Parliament for the dinner. They included the Senate

President and other parliamentarians, diplomats, senior public servants, and people from Canberra's many ethnic and Aboriginal communities.

It was a great, uniting event. Artistes of many cultural backgrounds gave their services. The dinner's three initiators spelt out their vision for Australia; they were joined by Philip Ruddock, Minister for Immigration and Multicultural Affairs, and Evelyn Scott, Chair of the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation. Radio and TV gave good coverage.

One of the initiators, Loc Luu, who came to Australia from Vietnam as a boy, said later, 'Now I no longer feel unwelcome. I feel wholly part of Australia.' Many echoed his sentiments.

CHAMPIONING MULTI-RACIALISM IN FIJI

A long cherished dream was fulfilled last month when I returned for seven days to Fiji, my first visit since our family's three years there in the early '90s. Apart from remaking the links with friends old and new, I attended the funeral of Josevata Kamikamica, a former Deputy Prime Minister and Finance Minister who, since his participation at the Lae (PNG) conference in 1973, has been a firm supporter, with his wife Esiteri, of the MRA programme in Fiji.

Lauded as 'a man of vision' by Fiji's Sunday Post, Joe Kamikamica was a champion of multi-racialism in Fiji and worked tirelessly to bring understanding and tolerance. He formed a new political grouping to tackle the legacy of distrust following the 1987 coup, reminding the country that, 'We shall not grow in stature and wealth by depriving others of their freedoms and opportunities'. Another friend — Adi Kuini Speed, widow of Prime Minister Timoci Bavadra who was deposed by the coup — succeeds him as party leader. She told me of her determination to follow the path of forgiveness and reconciliation.

WANANCHI AT WORK

We are seeing many developments as a result of the All-Africa conference for MRA in May. Imam Sheik Ali Shee from Mombasa, who was with us, has received more than a dozen letters from Christians asking him to visit their areas. He is thrilled and wants to initiate more meetings between people of different faiths.

In several places, 'wananchi' (citizens) who attended the conference have gone to heads of government departments, telling them of the challenge to live straight and inviting them to join in. In Tambach in the Rift Valley and in Nyahururu (Thompson's Falls), local people have organised conferences to introduce to their area the idea of living by absolute moral standards and God's guidance. MRA has been invited to sit on two committees that are working for a clean Kenya, and many organisations are ordering MRA films such as Freedom, Voice of the Hurricane, Is he my brother? and Wilberforce.

A MAGAZINE TO LIFT THE HEART

s of talks by paediatrician and social activist Dr Raj Anand and psychologist Maya Kripalani; of dialogues between parents and children on subjects such as TV (which created uproar); and of sharing experiences of tragedy, of healing, of change, in families. 'Quite a few of us emerged thoroughly churned inside, but much lighter,' writes Sheel.

Ten conferences took place at Asia Plateau between April 1 and June 30 this year. Mainly of four days duration, they were attended by a total of 600 people. They included Creative Leadership Programmes for industrial companies; a conference on 'Education Today – Society Tomorrow' for 70 teachers; a weeklong camp, 'Preparing the youth for the 21st Century' for 180 young people; a two-day programme for those who give religious leadership in the Indian Army; and a four-day Workshop on Media and Public Health for 51 journalists initiated by Rupa Chinai, and sponsored by UNICEF. The September-December programme at Asia Plateau is even fuller, with 12 conferences need.

THE FUTURE OF MOUNTAIN HOUSE

The Council of the Foundation for MRA met at the end of the Caux conferences, with great gratitude for the richness of the summer; for the variety of people that God had brought to Caux; for the fresh understandings and change in so many lives; and for all who took responsibility. Despite our tiredness after such busy days, the meeting was lively and positive.

The financial situation is fairly good, though this is because the presence of the SHMS (hotel school) enables us to carry out maintenance work and improvements, and because of recent legacies. We cannot be complacent. Despite the large number during the AFR session, the low number of bednights

overall for the summer and the low payment per night by many participants are a cause for concern.

We noted progress on such things as the water separation project and upgrading the fire alarm system. We planned renovation priorities. Finally we heard a report from the group which has surveyed personnel needs for our conferences. More information on this will be forthcoming, but the Council responds to the general conviction to keep Mountain House operating at its best for at least the next 5-10 years. To do this we will need fresh approaches, and we are exploring ideas that came up.
