TWO years ago, people in Kenya said, "God help us if Jomo Kenyatta comes into power," but, today, they are saying, "God help us if that man dies". Mr. Bremer Hofmeyr, leader of the Moral Re-Armament movement in Africa, told an audience invited by St. Stephen's Church to see the showing of the MRA film, "The Crowning Experience", last week.
