World assembly for unity

CAUX - SUR - MONTREUX
(Switzerland). — The 1953
World Assembly for Moral
Re-Armament has opened here
with parliamentary representa-
tives from Africa and India
present and industrial delega-
tions from many countries.

The Assembly is being held
at the request of Cabinet
Ministers and Government
leaders of nine European coun-
tries who stated in their cable
to Dr. Buchman, "The free
world needs something positive
to unite on, something great to
live for. In our opinion Moral
Re-Armament holds out the
hope of such a larger per-
spective."

The aims of the Assembly,
which will continue until Sep-
tember, were announced as
follows:

- To make universal the
knowledge of how to change
the difficult person in industry,
politics, the home, the school,
the press.

- To give evidence of the
alternative to Communism in
Asia, and across the world.

Above fear

- To demonstrate a new di-
mension of racial unity in
Africa, above suspicion, fear
and bitterness.

- To expand the programme
for industry in Europe and the
Americas, which is superceding
the class war, and which is
mobilising the powers of man-
agement and labour to produce
unity within nations and be-
tween nations.

- To win Russia, China and
all nations to a superior ideol-
ogy.

Amongst the delegates from
Africa taking part in the
opening sessions, are Chief
Barasa of Kenya, and the
Hon. J. S. Patel, an Indian
member of the Kenya Legis-
lative Council; and Mr. A.
Mwamuka, Secretary of the
Southern Rhodesia African
Association.

The early delegates from the
Union include Mr. Bremer Hof-
meyr, of Johannesburg, and Mr.
and Mrs. Chas. Rubidge and
Mr. Colin Bowker, of Graaff-
Reinet.
