JAPANESE MEET AT KOBE

In October, the 19th annual Kobe MRA Conference was inaugurated in this earthquake-recovered city. Seventy people attended from the Kansai region.

Speaking to the conference theme, 'Can Asia fulfil its role in response to the world's needs in the 21st century?', Yoshiteru Sumitomo stressed the need for Japan to be involved with Asia while also appreciating more deeply the development within Asian nations.

Five from the rest of Asia took part: Niketu Iralu and Alebu Peseyre from Nagaland, India; Liu Ren-Jou, Taiwan; Son Soubert, Cambodia; and K Haridas, Malaysia. They shared valuable insights and spoke of the moral leadership expected from Japan. When we met in smaller groups, many were moved to tears by the honest sharing and the expectations and sense of vision expressed about Japan's role in the modern world.

Among the 75 participants were Koreans, Chinese (including Uighuris), Cambodians, Bangladeshis, Sri Lankans, Iranians, Austrians and British - all living in Japan. For those of us who think of Japan as an island set apart and isolated from the Asian mainland it was a new perspective. In the discussion groups we explored how the atmosphere created in the home affected relations in society. There were great contrasts between those who live for their work to the detriment of their families, and those who place more value on family life! It was a time of learning together, from each other and about each other.

ROLES CHANGE IN JAPAN

In the General Election on October 20, Yukihisa was elected to the House of Representatives from the Tokyo proportional constituency for the newly-born Democratic Party of Japan (DPJ). Through an encounter with Yukio Hatoyama MP (a grandson of former Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama who decorated Frank Buchman) who participated in the Agenda for Reconciliation at Caux, and who is a co-founder of the DPJ, Yuki, with Leiko's backing,

accepted the unexpected guidance to stand. We are thankful for Yukio Hatoyama's generous support and the heartfelt prayers of those of you who knew our decision.

Yuki continues to be 'full time with MRA' – to work to remake the world by implementing MRA ideas in policy-making and by close care for those in national leadership. 'IN THE MIDDLE OF A PROCESS'

A dozen people – Christian and Muslim Palestinian, and Israeli – met recently in the home of a Palestinian lawyer following the deadly riots in Jerusalem. The lawyer wrote later:

'Recently we hosted in our home Jews and Arabs, mainly those who participated in Caux over the last years; it was a very daring step. We are in a bad situation, unclear and risky, but we hope that the peace process will succeed.

'I was astonished to see the cleamess and straightness from the Palestinian side, and the fair reaction from the Israeli side; they spoke about forgiveness but they also spoke about restoration; forgiveness cannot exist in a vacuum. We are still in the middle of a process; it is better to talk about understanding each other's needs.

'We tried to evaluate Caux's role in solving conflicts, and spoke about the Lebanese experience in Caux and through Caux.'

Recently, we both attended a briefing by the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, Mr José Ayala-Lasso, who represented Boutros Boutros-Ghali at the *Agenda for Reconciliation* at Caux.

The idea of a major public occasion in New York in the Spring has surfaced. This might build on the Agenda for Reconciliation theme, to which the Secretary General sent his excellent message. Conversations have begun with New Yorkers and others, including friends at the UN. We would welcome your thoughts.

Also much in our prayers is the need for more people in New York. Allan and Mary Griffith spent over a year here, and made an invaluable contribution. As the opportunities multiply we do need support, short-term and long-term. Do please let us know if you have any sense of God nudging you or someone else in this direction.

A NEW MILLENIUM, A NEW START

In Britain numerous plans are afoot to celebrate the millenium with exhibitions, buildings etc, etc, but little has yet been expressed about how it might affect the way each of us lives.

In Jewish law, the Jubilee year, the 50th, was sacred. Slaves were freed, rights and land were restored to those who had lost them, the slate cleaned and a fresh start made. Facing the symbolic deadline of a new millennium, what unfinished business should be completed?

On the 2000th anniversary of Jesus's birth, we might recall his teaching that when you bring an offering to the altar and then remember that someone has something against you, you should go and sort it out before offering your gift. During the *Agenda for Reconciliation* in Caux '96, I sensed that the

During the coming three years, could we, individually and nationally, identify the wrongs others feel we have committed against them, and seek steps of genuine service in atonement? In that way, some of the baggage of hates, hurts, fears and mistrust of this millennium need not be carried over into the next, and it could indeed signify a new start.

GROWTH POINTS SURVEY

Thank you to all who participated in this survey. Its aim was to identify areas of growth in our work, coming out of individual change and initiative; or, put another way, to discover where God's spirit is blowing. We received 215 responses from 82 people (i.e. many people listing more than one growth point) identifying 65 different growth points. There are some interesting trends.

In recent years we have seen the development of 'named programmes'. Fifty-seven responses singled out Foundations for Freedom, Hope in the Cities, International Communications Forum, Caux Scholars Program, Caux Round Table. In countries where MRA has been long established, particularly Western countries, it appears that a lot of current activity falls within one of these.

Fifty-three responses named one of the training or youth programmes of MRA around the world. We found this encouraging, in that those who responded to the survey were expressing what they are enthusiastic about.

Geographically, the largest number (43) identified activities in Central and Eastern Europe. (We should remember that the survey was largely carried out at Caux and that 64% of respondents were European.) Forty-two named initiatives with an element of reconciliation or peacemaking - in the Middle East, various parts of Africa, India, South East Asia and the Pacific, and inter-faith dialogue. Many of these have brought people to Caux for sessions such as Regions in Crisis or this year's Agenda for Reconciliation, and to similar conferences at Asia Plateau. Several people, in their responses evaluating the Agenda for Reconciliation, suggested that this work, which involves many of us around the world, might benefit from having a name and structure beyond that of an annual conference at Caux.

In summary, much of what we are about and which excites us falls into three overlapping categories – different named programmes; things to do with young people; and initiatives which have a 'healing the wounds of history' aspect to them. This report makes no attempt at commentary but simply looks at trends, and tries to discover where there is growth in our work and the nature of it, always remembering that the talk you had with your

neighbour yesterday, or will have tomorrow, can be the most vital thing any of us do.
