

MORAL RE-ARMAMENT

The World News Agency, Johannesburg reports:—An international group from Britain, Holland, Denmark and Switzerland arrived by air in Johannesburg on Monday morning November 13th to take part in the tour of the play "The Forgotten Factor" and the work of Moral Re-Armament in South Africa, Rhodesia and Kenya. Leading the path is Mr. John Leigh Mallory, from England, whose father, George Leigh Mallory, lost his life in the 1924 attempt on Mount Everest. Mr. Mallory himself served with the Chindits in the Burma Campaign during the war. The rest of the party are Miss Birgit Horneman and Miss Lilian Kjaer from Denmark; Mr. Jaap Windig from Holland; Miss Madi Hegetschweiler and Mr. Christian Luthi from Switzerland; and Miss Jill Gedye from England. Arriving with them is Miss Elma Kingswell of Cape Town who was one of the South African

delegation at the Moral Re-Armament Assembly at Caux, Switzerland. All the members of the party took part in the Caux Assembly during the past three months and have been working with Moral Re-Armament for several years in their own countries, as well as in the docks and industrial areas of England, Germany and France. The party were received by the Mayor of Roodepoort on Monday afternoon at 4.00 p.m. They will take part in the presentation of "The Forgotten Factor" in Roodepoort this week.
