NO RACE DIVISION: STATEMENTS AT M.R.A. ASSEMBLY

CAUX - SUR - MONTREUX
(Switzerland), Wednesday. —
Speakers from Germany, Australia
and Britain addressed the World
Assembly for Moral Re-Armament
here.

Dr. William Hoegner, former
Minister-President of Bavaria and
a member of the Supreme Court,
told 1,000 delegates from 32
nations: "Here at Caux we Ger-
mans have had to change. It
is not difficult to change at Caux.
Here every nation learns the same
things and everything becomes
different.

"There is no more division be-
tween race and race, between
Germans and French, between
employer and worker, between
capitalists and socialists. Caux
is the Tower of Babel put
into reverse. There the nations
of the world separated because
they could not get along together.
At Caux the nations learn the
same lesson—the lesson of
change."

Dr. Alfred Hartmann, Director of
Finance, Economic Council for
Bizonia, describing the great diffi-
culties of the area of Germany
where a fifth of the population
were refugees and where it was
only a year ago that it became
possible to begin the task of
clearing away the ruins, said:
"Material reconstruction by itself
is not enough. Last year a large
number of responsible Germans
were at Caux. It was due to the
spirit they brought back with them
to Germany that we have achieved
a great measure of teamwork to-
gether.

Colonel C. E. Ponsonby, British
M.P., said: "We have to look at
the world, at our fellow-country-
men, and possibly at ourselves
from a new viewpoint. We must
find the real answer to the
materialism that has taken root
with greater force than ever
before. Here a great movement
is starting which may make a
whole difference to mankind. Dr.
Buchman is to-day lighting at
Caux a fire which will never be
put out."

Mr. George MacKay, Mayor of
Port Adelaide, said: "I have
heard here statesmen, employers
and employes, and others testify-
ing that Moral Re-Armanent is
giving new hope to war-stricken
countries. I am convinced that
this superior ideology will and
must prevail. On my return to
Australia it will be my duty to
do all in my power to make the
ideology of Moral Re-Armament
the basis of our parliamentary,
municipal, industrial and everyday
life. In these last years Moral
Re-Armament has grown into a
national force in Australia and
New Zealand."
