The children, at Edward Feild Primary School in Bicester Road, Kidlington, were encouraged to mark the national campaign by writing down their bad memories before consigning them to the flames.

The idea is the brainchild of Oxford-based voluntary worker Edward Peters. His believes that people should mark the Millennium by putting aside something that has weighed on their consciences. He said: "It is a way of adding meaning to the event. We want people to use this time to think as well as to party."

The idea was born after Mr Peters, of Victoria Road, decided to bury the hatchet with some friends with whom he had fallen out.

He approached them, prepared to apologise if necessary and accept theirs if offered, and wipe the slate clean. The friendship was rekindled and the campaign was born.

Mr Peters said one woman's decision to 'clean her slate' had changed her life.
